

Opening Reflection by Geoff Milnes

Life is a struggle sometimes, isn't it? We struggle with all the things that have to be done when there doesn't seem to be enough time in each day to do them all. We struggle with balancing budgets at home – the 'eat or heat' problems that some have. We struggle with our health, the effort we put into living day to day with our infirmities. We struggle with our mental difficulties and battle with many other ailments that seem to plague us.



Sometimes we struggle with our faith.

Where is God when I can't get life in order so that I can do what is needed to be done? Where is God when I am weak and have no energy? Where is God when I am sick, injured, or hurting inside? Why can't I find Him when my faith is weak and uncertain?

The disciples must have had similar feelings, certainly about their faith, when the man they thought to be their Saviour, the one who would save them and lead them into the future, was taken from them and nailed to a cross and left hanging there until He was dead. Not only that, but his body had disappeared from the tomb in which it had been placed.

There they were, sitting in an upstairs room, wondering what they were to do, when suddenly, as if from nowhere, Jesus appeared to them. So, He hadn't left them after all!! There he was, standing in front of them as if nothing had happened. Yet the holes in his hands and side were evidence that He had been on that cross, that He had endured death. But His presence in that room showed the disciples that He hadn't left them, He hadn't deserted them, indeed the opposite was true – He had shown them that His power over death meant that He would never leave them, and that there was no need for anyone to think that He ever would.

Yet Thomas didn't believe what the disciples revealed to him. He wanted to see for himself that Jesus was alive, to put his hands in to the holes in his flesh. Only then would he believe. Jesus appeared to the disciples again and this time Thomas was present and put his hands into Jesus' wounds. Then it dawned on Thomas that Jesus would never leave, would be with them always.

The two disciples on the Emmaus Road were equally distraught at what had happened to Jesus and were so wrapped up in their dismay that they failed to recognise Jesus as He walked beside them. Only when they were offered bread and wine did the realisation dawn on them that they were in the presence of the Saviour, and they ran back to tell the others that they had seen Jesus.

Even Jesus thought that God had left Him. His words on the Cross – 'My God, My God why have you forsaken me' – are an echo of how the disciples felt after His death. Yet even in that darkest of hours God had not forsaken Jesus, for He was with Him through death and into the glorious, resurrected life that came afterwards.

God is with us always and understands and feels our struggles. Even Jesus was so moved by the death of Lazarus that, as we read in John's Gospel - Jesus wept. God has empathy with all our struggles and understands them, even if we don't know ourselves what causes them or what the solutions are. Just as Jesus hadn't deserted the disciples, so He hasn't deserted us in our time of struggle or uncertainty, and He never will. The very last words of Matthew's Gospel affirm that for all of us - 'I am with you always, to the end of the age'.



Whatever your struggles, hold fast to that promise of Jesus for He knows you, understands you, has empathy for you and will save you!!!! Even if you lose sight of Him, remember that He hasn't lost sight of you.

The service was followed by food and fellowship in **The Source**, Riverside's community café.

Christchurch, Leicester





At the start of Lent, **Christ Church**, Leicester made its Christmas tree trunk into a cross, as a reminder of the inextricable link between Christmas and Easter. Then each Sunday in Lent one symbol of Christ's passion was hung on or placed beside the cross, with bread and wine added at the Maundy Thursday Communion service (the first the church has had). Strangely, the wooden chalice used for that service leaked slightly, and has wine ever looked more like blood than when it 'bled' from the chalice?

The symbols were gradually removed during Christ Church's very popular Good Friday presentation... but were replaced by fresh spring flowers brought by the congregation on Easter morning, and the cross was then moved outdoors for passers-by to see.


