

The Price of Life

"Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground outside your Father's care. And even the very hairs of your head are all numbered. So don't be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows."

Matthew 10:29-31



I'm currently reading **Jenny Kleeman**'s captivating new book **The Price of Life**. In it, she tries to pin down the value that is placed on a human life. Our initial reaction may well be, "You can't put a price on a life!" but politicians, insurance companies and health professionals are constantly making decisions based on such calculations.

If a local council discovered a road safety measure that cost £500 and saved hundreds of lives, it would carry out the measure immediately. If it were to cost billions, and only save one life, they wouldn't do it. Somewhere between the two figures would be a balance point that would be the value which the council placed on a life.

The price varies dramatically depending on the context and Kleeman delves into many different worlds to find the stories and calculations that lie behind the stark numbers which head her chapters: from assassins to philanthropists; the NHS to slave traders; insurance companies to arms manufacturers.

One story in the book that stopped me in my tracks was a conversation between **Will MacAskill** (professor of Philosophy at Oxford) and **Giles Fraser** (Anglican Priest). MacAskill created a form of philanthropy called "Effective Altruism" where charitable donations are focused to "where they can do the most good." This way of giving makes a lot of sense and is the reason why a lot of the world's richest people donate huge amounts of money to causes in Africa such as malaria prevention and deworming programmes (Jeff Bezos founder of Amazon – donates around \$10 billion a year). Saving a life in Africa costs between £3,000 and

£4,000. The price of life is far less in some parts of the world than others.

Giles asked Will a question: "If a house, containing a child and a Picasso painting, was on fire, and you could only save one, would you save the child or the Picasso?" Will knew that the proceeds of selling the painting would mean that he could save thousands of children and so he, confidently and unapologetically, answered that he would save the Picasso.

Logically, it makes some kind of sense, but it's a horrible and offensive thought.

"The Price of Life" is not a religious book, but the stories in it constantly cause me to reflect on big questions and, ultimately, to ask what God's view on all of this is. In Matthew 10, Jesus refers to the way that humans use money to value things. Sparrows are worth an "ha'penny" and humans are worth more than "many sparrows" - which doesn't really clarify things!

Jesus isn't trying to help us calculate a number, but shows us that, despite the arbitrary prices that humans may come up with, God values things in a very different way. God values us by loving us, not by calculating a price. The maths of love doesn't ever quite add up properly.

It makes me think of **Graham Kendrick**'s song "How much do you think you are worth?" If you don't know it (it was a 70's classic!) then you can listen to it here: https://youtu.be/e5rAiVgILUA

The song reminds us that the value of anything comes down to how much someone is willing to pay. That price is at the heart of our churches and our lives as Christians. God is very clear about what we are worth and about the price that he was willing to pay. It comes down to one verse in John's gospel.

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.

John 3:16 (NIV)





Synod Team on Tour



ECO News

Charles Jolly, Associate Member of our Justice, Peace & the Integrity of Creation group (JPIC), shares this update:

The Global Plastics Treaty

In striving to safeguard the integrity of Creation, we are confronted by serious environmental degradation resulting from climate change, biodiversity loss and pollution (especially chemical and plastic). Most scientists agree that there's still time to take effective action provided that we act now.

2024 could mark a turning point in rolling back **plastic pollution**, with final negotiations on the first ever global treaty to attempt this scheduled for December in South Korea. The latest round of talks was held in Ottawa this April, but there are still deep divisions between the parties involved.



The 66 nations of the **High Ambition Coalition**, consisting mainly of the EU (along with the UK), Japan and island nations, want to end plastic pollution by 2040 but most petroleum-producing countries together with most petro-chemical industries and many large corporations seem opposed to legally binding targets and strong regulations because of self-interest.

What can we do?

- 1. Every **action** that we can take helps to reduce pollution and to reinforce public pressure for change. Individuals and businesses can take action in this order (not only for plastics, of course):
 - Refuse plastic items (especially where there is a viable alternative)

- Reduce use of plastic (especially of single-use plastic as much as possible)
- Reuse plastic items (e.g. food containers, refilling printer cartridges)
- Repurpose (or Upcycle be creative and think divergently)
- **Recycle** (bigger supermarkets often take formerly 'hard to recycle' products like crisp packets and (clean) single-use plastics maybe collect these centrally at church?)
- 2. **Add your voice** to campaigns and sign petitions for change. For example, Tearfund's: https://www.tearfund.org/forms/rubbish-campaign-petition
- 3. **Write to your local MP**; encourage the Government to stand firm in the treaty negotiations. Ask demanding questions at hustings when the general election is announced.

A Prayer for an Effective Treaty to End Plastic Pollution

Almighty God, you call us to care for your beautiful planet. We are filled with sorrow by the environmental degradation that we humans have caused through ignorance, carelessness and greed.

We thank you for everyone who is working to sustain and renew the life of Earth, especially for the negotiations this year towards a treaty to eliminate plastic pollution.

We remember before you all those who are negotiating on the treaty. We recognise that there are many different interests involved and ask that you will give all parties wisdom and insight and a commitment to the greater good. May the High Ambition Coalition hold firm to their target of ending all plastic pollution by 2040.

We pray for the two billion people who have no waste collections, for the many who try to make a living picking materials on the huge refuse heaps in poor countries and for other species that are being harmed by plastic pollution. We pray that the integrity of Creation will be restored. For the sake of Jesus Christ, who came to make all things new, Amen.

What can you do to get involved?


